EOAC Head Start Community Assessment Summary

EOAC Head Start's latest full Community Assessment (CA), completed in 2023, documents the needs assessment process, results, analysis, and conclusions that Economic Opportunities Advancement Corporation (EOAC) will employ to address unmet or under-met needs of low-income families and the communities in which they live. It helps guide the agency in decision-making, strategizing, and moving forward with the organization's development.

The Kids Count Data Book, a primary source of data and information for the CA, is an annual publication that assesses child well-being nationally and across the fifty states. Using an index of sixteen indicators, the 2023 report



ranks states on overall child well-being in four domains: economic well-being, education, health, as well as family and community. The 2023 Kids Count Data Book ranks the State of Texas at number 44 overall in the nation for the well-being of its children. Furthermore, Texas ranked 39th in Economic Well-being, 27th in education, 48th in health, and 47th in Family and Community compared to other states in the United States.

While Texas does not have excessively high rankings among the four domains measured to determine a child's well-being, the state still has many strengths among its cities and counties. In 2021, the state lowered its average percentage from 2019 in the following family and community categories: children in single-parent families (34%), children in families where the household head lacks a high school diploma (16%), children living in high-poverty areas (12%), and teen births per 1,000 individual (20%). However, the state of Texas could improve its economic well-being and provide health services to residents. In 2021, the state saw an increase in their average percentage from 2019 in the following categories: children in poverty (20%), children whose parents lack secure employment (28%), children living in households with a high housing cost burden (32%), low birth weight babies (8.6%), child and teen deaths per 100,000 (30), and children and teens who are overweight or obese (40%).

Strengths of the program's service area and EOAC begin with the agency's ability to serve center-based Early Head Start-aged children. There is an immediate need for high-quality and affordable childcare for residents in both counties. While EOAC can provide services for a small population sample, the data displays a greater need than what is currently offered. There is an abundance of children and families that live in these counties and would qualify for Head Start services. Therefore, there is no shortage of individuals who could utilize and benefit from the program. Another great strength for EOAC and the community is the early intervention programs within the program's service area. With at least nine agencies willing and able to serve children in the service area, early detection can assist children and families in accessing the services needed for their children.

Challenges the program's service area and EOAC have encountered consist of but are not limited to the following: a lack of mental health support to low-income and at-risk families, high-cost housing rates causing people to relocate, and inequities among ethnicities and genders. While the health of McLennan County is in good standing, Falls County is among the unhealthiest counties in Texas. Additional support and resources are in dire need in Falls County. With high rates of preterm births, low birth weights, and infant mortality, pregnant women would benefit from the support and opportunities the program has to offer. While an expansion of EOAC services would benefit the community, the agency will have the challenge of locating additional space and addressing the pressing need for public transportation for families to get their children to school. One last challenge the agency has ahead of them is the vast differences between Fall County and McLennan County. Trying to provide services to children and families in these areas will have to be targeted toward the specific county where children reside and the centers are located. A one-size-fits-all approach cannot be applied to the two counties.

*Full Enrollment Initiative

In 2023, EOAC faced challenges in achieving full enrollment, leading to classroom closures. These challenges stemmed from a shortage of qualified staff, recruitment difficulties, and staff retention issues. As a result, EOAC was placed under the Full Enrollment Initiative starting July 10, 2023, for 12 months. This initiative was required because the



program operated below full-funded enrollment for at least four consecutive months.

EOAC was tasked with achieving at least 97% enrollment during this period. The organization implemented several measures to address under-enrollment, including completing the required monthly Center-Level Enrollment Reporting for each site, and collaborated with the Regional Office to develop a comprehensive plan and timeline for reducing or eliminating under-enrollment.

The plan included:

- Applying for a Change in Scope to reduce enrollment and increase staff salaries.
- Requesting waivers for Head Start teacher education requirements.

In 2023, EOAC was awarded a Change in Scope: Enrollment Reduction and secured teacher waivers for several staff members. In 2024, EOAC submitted an additional application for a Change in Scope: Enrollment Conversion, which was approved in August 2024. This timing delayed full enrollment due to securing classroom licensure, purchasing new equipment, and hiring 14 new EHS teachers.

Because of these efforts, we've progressed toward meeting full enrollment and anticipate meeting enrollment in January 2025.

Preparing Children for Kindergarten

Curriculum

EOAC Head Start implements a robust educational framework using the Frog Street Pre-K, Frog Street for Twos, and Frog Street Infant curricula. To enrich the learning experience, curriculum supplements include *I Am Moving, I Am Learning (IMIL)*, CLI Engage, *Creative Curriculum, More Than Mudpies*, and *Choosy Kids*.

A key component of the Frog Street curriculum is *Conscious Discipline*, a comprehensive classroom management system designed to create a safe and nurturing learning environment. This system supports children's social-emotional growth and development, empowering EOAC Head Start staff to foster positive interactions and emotional resilience.

Developmental Screening & Assessment

EOAC Head Start employs research-based tools to screen for developmental concerns and monitor children's growth and progress.

Screenings

- **Developmental Screenings**: Conducted within 45 days of a child's enrollment in the Early Head Start or Head Start programs using the *Ages and Stages Questionnaire*, *Third Edition (ASQ-3)*.
- **Social-Emotional Screenings**: These screenings are also completed within 45 days of enrollment using the *Ages and Stages Social-Emotional Questionnaire (ASQ-SE)*.
- Screenings adhere to the Texas Periodicity Schedule.

Referrals

When screenings indicate a potential need for further evaluation:

- Infants and toddlers are referred to Klaras Children's Center Early Childhood Intervention (ECI) with parental consent.
- Three- and four-year-olds are referred to the Local Education Agency (LEA) for additional assessment with parental permission.

Developmental Assessment

Assessment data is critical for identifying individual growth, setting personalized goals, and tailoring classroom activities. It also informs staff development planning and ensures progress is communicated to parents and funding sources. Furthermore, this data tracks progress toward achieving School Readiness Goals.

School Readiness Goals

Developmental Assessment Systems



EOAC Head Start and Early Head Start programs utilize comprehensive, research-based assessment systems to monitor and support children's developmental progress. These systems ensure that each child's growth is tracked across critical developmental domains, providing teachers with valuable insights to guide individualized instruction and learning experiences.

The Head Start program uses the Children's Learning Institute


(CLI) Engage Progress Monitoring system. In contrast, the Early Head Start program employs Teaching Strategies GOLD®. Both systems are designed to align with state and federal early learning standards, including the Texas Early Learning Guidelines and the Head Start Early Learning Outcomes Framework. These tools enable teachers to evaluate children through direct assessments, ongoing observations, and family input. Data collected at multiple checkpoints throughout the year informs individualized learning plans, ensures alignment with EOAC school readiness goals, and facilitates communication with families and stakeholders about each child's progress.


The following sections provide an overview of each assessment system and its role in fostering the development and success of EOAC Head Start and Early Head Start children.

Head Start Assessment System: Children's Learning Institute (CLI) Engage Progress Monitoring

- Utilizes 15 research-based measures to evaluate key developmental areas.
- Combines direct, one-on-one assessments conducted by teachers with observation-based assessments derived from ongoing student observations.
 - o Direct assessments involve 9 measures conducted with individual children.
 - Observation-based assessments include 6 measures, with teaching staff documenting multiple weekly observations for each child.
- Progress is monitored at three key checkpoints: the Beginning of the Year (BOY/fall), Middle of the Year (MOY/winter), and End of the Year (EOY/spring).

Outcomes of Head Start School Readiness Goals






Early Head Start Assessment System: Teaching Strategies GOLD®

- 1. Relies on teacher and family observations of children during everyday experiences. Teachers document multiple weekly observations for each child, focusing on 23 research-based objectives across six developmental domains: Social-Emotional, Physical, Language, Cognitive, Literacy, and Mathematics.
- 2. Features a color-coded system to represent widely held developmental expectations for children. Each objective includes color bands indicating expected developmental milestones by age group.
- 3. Enables teachers to create individual child profiles, identifying each child's current knowledge and guiding tailored scaffolding for further learning. Data is reviewed and summarized at designated checkpoints.
- Checkpoints occur at the Beginning of the Year (BOY/fall), Middle of the Year (MOY/winter), End of the Year (EOY/spring), and summer.

Family Services & Parent Engagement

EOAC Head Start/Early Head Start actively engages families through various services and activities designed to foster parent involvement, build community, and support children's development.

 Parent Meetings: Each EOAC Head Start/Early Head Start location hosted regular parent meetings via Zoom or in-person through their Parent Committees.



- **Policy Council**: Policy Council meetings were conducted monthly via Zoom, ensuring active governance and parental input.
- Family Partnership Plans: Child & Family Advocates work with families through a structured approach to engage families in their children's education and their own growth. It involves building partnerships between staff and families, identifying family strengths and needs, setting goals, and providing resources and support.
- **Home Visits and Conferences**: Families participated in two home visits and two parent-teacher conferences during the school year, promoting collaboration between teachers and families.
- **Special Events and Celebrations**: A variety of engaging activities were organized at the sites, including:
 - Head Start Awareness Month (October 2024)
 - Grandparents Day (September 2023)
 - Father & Male Engagement Kickoff (September 2023)
 - Trunk or Treat Drive-Thru Health Fair (October 2023)
 - Harvest Meal (November 2023)
 - Winter Wonderland (December 2023)
 - Black History Program (February 2024)
 - Valentine's Food Activity (February 2024)
 - Box Car Show: Children, with the help of their parents, created cars from cardboard boxes (March 2024).
 - Transition Ceremonies: Celebrations were held at each Head Start facility and collaboration site to honor students transitioning to kindergarten (May 2024).
 - Muffins with Moms (May 2024)
 - Volunteer Recognition Banquet (May 2024)
 - Delicious Cookies with Dads (June 2024)
 - End-of-Year Father Engagement Activity: A fun bowling event at Main Event (June 2024).

These activities reflect EOAC's commitment to fostering meaningful connections with families and creating a vibrant, inclusive community where children and their families thrive.



Parent Training Opportunities

EOAC Head Start/Early Head Start offers a variety of training sessions and activities to empower parents and support family well-being. These opportunities include:

- Program Governance Training: Equipping parents with the knowledge and skills to participate
 effectively in program decision-making.
- Parenting Instruction: Featuring *Ready Rosie* and *Learning Genie* videos and activities to support parenting strategies and child development.
- Car Seat Safety: Ensuring families are informed about proper car seat usage and installation.
- CPR and First Aid Classes: Providing essential life-saving skills for emergencies.
- Health Fair and Trunk or Treat: Promoting health awareness in a fun, family-friendly environment.
- Healthy Living Workshops:
 - Healthy Recipes, Cooking Classes, and Zumba: Led by April Strickland from the Texas Agricultural Extension to encourage active and nutritious lifestyles.
 - Healthy Food Preparation: Guided by Lisa M. Hoelscher, RD, LD, to teach families how to prepare balanced and wholesome meals.

These engaging and educational opportunities are designed to support parents in fostering healthier, safer, and more nurturing environments for their families.

Education Resources Shared with Parents

EOAC Head Start/Early Head Start provides parents with valuable information about educational and career advancement opportunities, including:

- GED and ESL Programs: Resources to support parents in earning their General Education Development (GED) diploma or improving English language skills.
- Child Development Associate (CDA) Certificate: Guidance for parents interested in pursuing a CDA credential to advance in early childhood education.
- College Courses: Information about local colleges and programs to help parents further their education.
- Library Cards: Encouraging family literacy by facilitating access to local library resources.
- Professional Licenses: Support for parents seeking certifications or licenses in fields such as:
 - Certified Nursing Assistant (CNA)
 - Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning (HVAC)
 - Truck Driving
 - Barbering

These resources are designed to empower parents to achieve their personal, educational, and professional goals.

Community Collaborations & Support

Public School Partnerships

EOAC Head Start is proud to collaborate with local school districts to maximize resources and provide comprehensive support for children preparing to enter kindergarten. Through these partnerships, Pre-K children are dually enrolled in the school district's Pre-K and EOAC Head Start programs.

In this collaborative model, known as *Jumpstart*, Head Start teachers with degrees work alongside certified district teachers in district Pre-K classrooms. This joint approach ensures a cohesive learning environment that addresses each child's academic, social, and emotional needs. During the 2023–2024 school year, EOAC Head Start maintained Pre-K collaboration classrooms with the following districts:

These partnerships reflect EOAC's commitment to fostering strong community connections and supporting children's success as they transition into kindergarten.
